# News from the Upper Phase

## Year 5

Year 5 began this half term thinking about sports, with each class taking part in an Olympic style inspiration day. The children experienced a whole day of Olympic-themed activities where they became athletes, sports scientists, and inventors. All of the classes learned about the different Olympic traditions from around the world and at the end they were challenged to design and create an Olympic sport of their own. For their excellent work, the year group took part in a mini-Olympic games winning prizes for their classes!



### Maths


Over the past few weeks, the children have been recapping sections within the maths curriculum; this was in preparation for their assessments. The children started off by looking at volume and its relationship to different metric measurements. The children then moved on to looking at Roman numerals, time and properties of 2D and 3D shapes. Challenge your child to calculate the year using Roman numerals! Other topics covered include using formal written methods to multiply and divide, number patterns and negative numbers. Encourage your child at home to continue justifying their answers through explanations and pictorial/written explanations.

### English

This term in English, Year 5 pupils have geared up for the Andrew Lane Writing Competition through analysing the book *Holes* by *Louis Sachar*. The children used the theme of time traveling to create stories that involved flashbacks, with the overall winner coming from a Year 5 class! The children have now moved onto looking at non-fiction writing and will be creating informal and formal letters during the next couple of weeks. Year 5 will end the year by creating biographies of famous Olympians and this will be rounded off with children creating their very own auto-biography.



### Wider Curriculum

Our topic this term is a continuation of ancient and modern Greece which will be explored through the study of the Olympics. The children have been researching about the history of the ancient Olympic games and have been making comparisons with the modern day Olympics. They have been using iPads and laptops to research how influential the Olympics are within the political world and have created some fantastic artwork inspired by famous artists.



### Science

The children have been learning about the reproduction process of plants. They have learnt to identify the reproductive organs as well as describe the process of pollination, fertilisation and germination.

**Attend Today, Achieve Tomorrow**

### Term time leave:

“Changes in the law mean that the Headteacher no longer has discretion to allow pupils to take term time leave.

If you take your child out of school for any reason you will receive **a fine of £60 per child per parent** if paid within **21 days**. **If this fine were not paid within the time limit, the penalty would rise to £120 which must be paid within 28 days.**

This means that the mum will be fined £60 for each child and the dad will be fined £60 for each child.

The government monitors **school attendance and punctuality**. They look at persistent absence and lateness. If your child has attendance of 90% or less they are deemed persistent absences and we are asked to follow this up and refer to the Local Authority who could take you to court. At court, the penalty is either a very large fine of up to £2,500 or imprisonment.


Please avoid keeping your child off school unless they are very sick and certainly **DO NOT TAKE THEM OUT OF SCHOOL WHEN THE SCHOOL IS OPEN**. Please wait until the holidays.”
