



Dear Brampton Family,



Our **parents' evening** went smoothly on both nights. As I walked the building, parents/carers shared their positive experiences of the school and there were lots of smiles all round.

We have had 108 parents/carers complete the Ofsted Parent View. 90% said that they felt that their child was happy. 91% agreed that their child was safe. 83% said that their child has not been bullied or that they felt the school dealt with any incidents well – please remind your children to tell a trusted adult if they ever feel they are being bullied. 90% agreed that their child does well at this school. 86% would recommend this school to others. These are a good set of views and it paints the school in a positive light, which it definitely deserves. We would, however, like these percentages to be even higher.

This month we marked **Children's Mental Health Week**, taking a lot of time to reflect upon the theme of 'Connection' and how this impacts upon our emotional health. We are incredibly proud of our school community and the many ways in which we all ensure children thrive and realise their full potential. We have also held various parent workshops this month and want to say a huge thank you to parents who attended. Please do look out for the invitations in the future.

We are very excited to announce that Ms Valverde secured the **Silver Level** in the prestigious **Global School Award**. The award recognises the whole school commitment to creative and innovative global education, and Ms Valverde's dedication and commitment to BPS. We are very lucky to have her teaching Spanish in our school.

Thank you to Ms Reay who organised, with her wonderful team, a very positive trip to **Fairplay House.** One parent commented:

It has been very reassuring to have regular updates, and I realise how busy and full-on any sort of educational visit is for staff. News from Year 4 (Mid phase)

In English lessons, the children have been **exploring poetry.** They have looked at a range of different poetic devices and how it has an impact on the reader. The poem *The Day I Fell Down the Toilet* is a poem by Steven Turner has been a wonderful stimulus for writing and the children absolutely love it. They will be using the poem to write their own creative narrative.

In mathematics, the children have begun to learn to read time on an **analogue clock**. It is crucial for children to tell the time accurately, know the difference between am and pm and convert digital times to analogue and vice versa. The children will then be moving on to word problems involving time. Please encourage your child to tell the time accurately at home to embed the skill to real life situations.

Some children went to **Fairplay House** last week, for three days. All of the children were incredibly well behaved and really faced their fears! They demonstrated what resilience, determination and perseverance looked like and were the epitome of being brave! The children had the chance to have a go at the zip wire, climbing the high ropes, go on a giant swing and do some archery. They also had a night where they enjoyed a bonfire, eat marshmallows, listen to nature and look up at the many stars above them; the night then ended the night with hot chocolate.

The children were also dropped off in the dark, in the middle of the forest, where they were to find their way back to the house. All of the activities required team work and listening skills which they all did exceptionally well. They learnt life-long skills such as putting on their own duvet covers and making their beds, cleaning tables and washing the dishes as well as working as a team and pushing their own boundaries.

"I burst my fear bubble," was something that Anastasia quoted and Zahran announces, "I didn't know I was this brave," which just goes to show what happens when we step out of comfort zone. Bikeworks - inclusive drop-in cycling club (Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park)

Come along to the Bikeworks' weekly inclusive drop-in cycling club in Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The clubs offer the chance for people of all abilities and experience levels to try out our range of adapted cycles in an off road park environment. The cycles we have include: standard two wheel cycles, tricycles, side by side cycles, recumbents, hand cycles and wheelchair platform
