

Communication and Language



• We will be developing our listening and attention skills through listening to stories that are being read or told to us. We will be listening to others one to one and in small groups. We will talk about ourselves, our families and people who help us using a wider range of vocabulary. We will learn to listen to others and answer 'who, what, where' in simple questions. We will learn to respond to instructions that has two parts, such as: "Get your coat and wait at the door."













PSHE Celebrating Difference

We will be focusing on key skills:

- ✓ independence—putting own coat and welly boots on;
- √ following our class rules and understanding why they are important;
- ✓ taking turns and sharing.



We will also be learning to be aware of our feelings and the feelings of others.







Physical Development







We will be developing our gross motor skills indoors, outdoors and during PE sessions. This half term the focus will be on developing spatial awareness, movement skills and hand/feet to eye coordination. We will work on lots of fine motor activities to practise forming the correct pencil grip.












Literacy













Children will be recognising familiar text and signs in the environment. They will be learning to identify letters in their name and will have a go at writing the initial letter of their name. When writing or drawing, children will be encouraged to ascribe meaning to marks that they make. In Phonics we will be tuning in to sounds (auditory discrimination), listening and remembering sounds (auditory memory and sequencing) and talking about sounds (developing vocabulary and language comprehension).

Books are now being sent home and will be changed weekly.










Maths







We will practise counting aloud to ensure that children use one-to-one principal when counting and know that the last number reached when counting a small set of objects tells how many there are in total ('cardinal principle'). We will be learning that objects can be compared and ordered by size and by their mass. Children will be introduced to patterns and explore simple examples to develop their understanding of both the word and the concept.









Understanding the World

RE using the 2022 Newham Agreed Syllabus

RE-related activities focus on three themes:

- celebrating special times
- aspects of identity and relationships
- stories and what they tell us

This half term we will be exploring 'What happens at Diwali?' and 'What happens at Christmas?'



Children will discuss how people celebrate different festivals and celebrations as a family and will be encouraged to share their experiences.

We will be looking at different people in our community that help us. A visit from the Fire Brigade & Police, as well as a visit to the post box will help develop an understanding of different occupations and what they do to help us.







Expressive Arts & Design







Children will explore different materials freely. They will develop their own ideas and then decide which materials to use to express them. Children will take part in pretend play indoors and outdoors. Children will develop their repertoire of songs that they know to include number songs and Christmas songs. They will be exploring the different sounds that instruments make.

Behaviour & Expectations

Home Learning



- Reading: The children will continue to take home story books and library books each
 week. We encourage families to read with their child every day and make a comment in
 their Reading Record once a week.
- Your child also has access to Oxford Reading Buddy where they can access a variety of online story books. You can find their login details in the back of their Reading Record.
- In addition, you could use the oxford owl website which has a number of free e-readers you could share together: https://www.oxfordowl.co.uk/
- Phonics, Maths and other home learning tasks are uploaded to Tapestry each week.









Supporting Pupils at Home

- Speak to your child about the things they are doing at nursery.
- Share stories and make some of your own up too!
- Join your child in their play, build together, laugh together, sing and dance
- Cook together.
- Get your child to help you with preparing for meal times, counting cutlery or cups.
- Go for a walk and look for treasure (feathers, stones, puddles, grass, cats... anything that you love!)
- Talk about their emotions and how they are feeling at different times (happy, sad, angry, confused etc).









Behaviour

We promote the development of a sense of right and wrong by teaching your child the appropriate way to act and discouraging unacceptable behaviour. Sometimes it is necessary to help children understand their own boundaries in certain situations, explaining why we do not accept certain behaviours. We believe that all children have a right to feel valued, respected, and safe. For this to happen in practice, we have a responsibility to behave in ways that enable all of us to feel free to explore and learn without fear of being hindered or hurt.

Young children usually misbehave because they have not yet learnt how to react to feelings and needs in acceptable ways.

Brampton Primary School Music Accelerator Programme




Proposed budget
