



Communication and Language



Children will develop listening skills, through learning rhymes and listening to longer stories. They will be encouraged to re-tell stories using props, small world and role-play. There will be opportunities for children to talk about what they see and observe when engaging in topic related activities and experiments.












Personal, Social, Emotional Development



PSHE Dreams and Goals







We will be continuing to talk about the importance of sharing the feelings and emotions of ourselves and others, looking at ways to express them.

Through adult modelling and guidance, the children will learn how to look after their bodies, including healthy eating.









Physical Development







This half term we will be focusing on climbing and balancing on different equipment. Children will develop their fine motor skills and be encouraged to show a preference for a dominant hand. They will have lots of opportunities to practice name writing and forming letters from their name, whilst practicing their pencil grip.
















Children will be joining in with rhymes and repeated refrains. They will be encouraged to talk about familiar books, think about what might happen next and talk about their favourite part of the story. They will be developing their ability to write through mark-making activities.















We will use lots and lots of oral Fred Talk in Nursery. This is where we say words in sounds and encourage children to work out what is being said. For example, 'Can you get your c-oa-t (coat)'. Fred the frog can only talk in sounds and they have to work out the words he is saying.

Before teaching the first 30 sounds explicitly we look at the Read, Write, Inc freeze chart and learn about the pictures and what we can see in them. We emphasize the sound at the start of the picture. For example, mmmmmmm mountain!











Maths





- Children will explore different representations of 1, 2 and 3. Children will learn to confidently say the number names 'one', 'two' and 'three' out loud. Once they can do this, they will match the verbal number names to numerals and quantities. We will encourage children to count to three using objects in different arrangements by touching each object as they count.
- Children will focus on the different shapes all around us and will go on a shape hunt. We will also use shapes for printing, sorting, naming and making pictures and patterns.









Understanding the World

RE using the 2022 Newham Agreed Syllabus

RE-related activities focus on three themes:

- celebrating special times
- aspects of identity and relationships
- stories and what they tell us

This half term we will be exploring 'How do people celebrate Lunar New Year?'







We will be exploring changes in the weather, looking for signs of change in the environment such as trees and wildlife. Children will be developing an understanding of what is happening and the changes that occur during melting and freezing. We will be learning how people around the world celebrate Lunar new year. We will also be planning, designing and building a dragon which will lead onto learning how to perform the dragon dance.







Expressive Arts & Design







Children will continue to practice previous skills of cutting, painting, printing and sticking. They will begin to learn the new skill of cutting with a purpose in mind and using tape to stick. They will have lots of opportunities to take part in simple role play, and be encouraged to develop complex stories using small world toys.

Behaviour & Expectations

- Punctuality and attendance are crucial for both academic and social development.

- We expect pupils to make the most of their time in nursery- focus and attention are key (and we ensure the lessons are enjoyable and memorable).

Supporting Pupils at Home

- Speak to your child about the things they are doing at nursery.
- Share stories and make some of your own up too!
- Join your child in their play, build together, laugh together, sing and dance
- Cook together.
- Get your child to help you with preparing for meal times, counting cutlery or cups.
- Go for a walk and look for treasure (feathers, stones, puddles, grass, cats... anything that you love!)
- Talk about their emotions and how they are feeling at different times (happy, sad, angry, confused etc).









Behaviour

We promote the development of a sense of right and wrong by teaching your child the appropriate way to act and discouraging unacceptable behaviour. Sometimes it is necessary to help children understand their own boundaries in certain situations, explaining why we do not accept certain behaviours. We believe that all children have a right to feel valued, respected, and safe. For this to happen in practice, we have a responsibility to behave in ways that enable all of us to feel free to explore and learn without fear of being hindered or hurt.

Young children usually misbehave because they have not yet learnt how to react to feelings and needs in acceptable ways.

- Reading: The children will continue to take home story books and library books each
 week. We encourage families to read with their child every day and make a comment in
 their Reading Record once a week.
